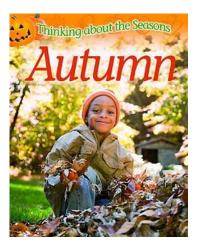
What to do at home together:

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Our book of the fortnight is: Autumn By various authors



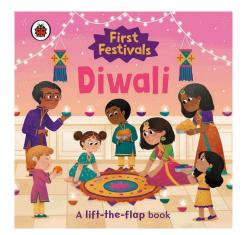
Non - fiction texts like this support the children to explore seasons, learning some interesting facts and seeing photographs. The book helps children to understand the changes seen as autumn sets in. It creates an interest for children to go outdoors and experience the awe and wonder of nature.

How to get the most out of reading to young children:

- Sit close together. You could encourage your child to hold the book themselves and turn the pages, too.
- Take a look at the pictures. You don't just have to read the words on the page. Talk to the children about pictures have they seen these things on their walk to school or in their garden.
- Ask questions and talk about the book. What do they think will happen next? How do we know when Autumn is over and another season is starting?
- Have fun! There's no right or wrong way to share a story as long as you and your child are having fun. Don't be afraid to act out situations or use funny voices... your little ones will love it!

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Our book of the fortnight is: Diwali



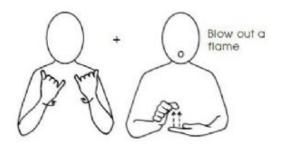
This story explores the celebration of Diwali across the world. These books give children the opportunity to explore a festival that may be the same or different to one that they celebrate.

Learning about all festivals and celebrations helps children to understand similarities between communities and faiths.

How to get the most out of reading to young children:

- Be expressive!
- Picture books can be a great way to talk through your child's fears and worries, or to help them deal with their emotions. Give them space to talk, and ask how they feel about the situations in the story.
- Use props and toys to act out the story, either whilst you are reading it, or together afterwards

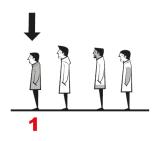
